1. Call to Order

President Kristi Kind called the meeting to order at 10:02 am.

2. Announcements

President Cathi Block announced that Shereen Rowland will be the 2026 Plant Sale Coordinator.

Terry DeJongh announced that the CSC Head Start in Lincoln City contacted him with a proposal to partner with LCMGA to establish a school garden. Their proposal is attached. (School Garden Proposal letter_250908_112140.pdf) Julie Roth-Carter will contact them for additional information.

3. Approval of Minutes

Secretary Emilia Lacy made a motion to approve the August 11, 2025 meeting minutes. Gary Dorris seconded. Motion was approved.

4. Treasurer's Report/Financial Discussions

Treasurer Gary Dorris reported that the Association received a \$100. donation in memory of Claudette Schroeder from her "Circle of Friends". Claudette, a Life member of LCMGA and designated "Tomato Queen", had a memorial stone placed by her circle of friends at the South Beach Demo Garden.

Gary devised an official form for donation. A copy is attached.

5. Updates

Co-Vice Presidents

Julie Roth-Carter stated that two paper banners with LCMGA logos are available for member thank you notes and signatures. The banners will be available at OSU Extension up to the date of the picnic; they will acknowledge the contributions the entire membership made this year to the association. President Marlene Shapiro will deliver a message of appreciation at the picnic. Forty-four members have signed up to attend.

Education & Outreach: Julie Roth-Carter

Julie said the OCCC's "Catch the Wave" publication of classes has been released. She thanked Martha Mills, the lead on this project, class presenters and Steve Vogel for his photographic skill in using a drone to capture garden images.

Julie stated that planning for the 2026 educational conference is underway. Scheduled for March 28, 2026, the theme relates to restoring garden eco-systems and climate resilience. Carol Hardy, MG from Multnomah County will be the keynote speaker. Carol is an adjunct faculty member at Portland State University, a forest ecologist and environmental science educator, the 2025 statewide winner of the "Growing and Belonging" award at the Joy of Gardening Conference, a certifier of the Backyard Habitant Program, and is deeply involved in many other garden related activities. There are plans for a second speaker. Arrangements have been made for the event at Samaritan Health Education Center, where the entire facility will be used for conference and tabling events.

Julie asked the Board to formalize approval for the O & E Committee to move forward with executing plans for the 2026 LCMGA sponsored educational conference to be held in March at the Samaritan Health Center. A vote was taken and the approval was granted.

Trish reported that the 3rd Quarter OMGA Meeting was a Zoom meeting. During this meeting, discussions included: course development and revisions of the MG notebook, climate resilience, seed implementations, dig and divide, Joy of Gardening (JOG) Conference financial results (\$40,000+, of which \$5,416 was from silent auction), registration numbers at JOG, budget proposals for grants, etc. Trish suggested the grant committee review the 2025 OMGA Grant Awards for prospective ideas. (Attachment) The OMGA Treasurer is proposing use of one uniform accounting system, Quicken, for all chapters. OMGA has a new website. 2026 marks the 50th Anniversary of Master Gardeners in Oregon. This will be the JOG theme. There is a proposal to change OMGA quarterly meetings to on-site meetings at various chapters. Shelby Schuppe is the president elect for 2026.

Program Updates: Stormi Dykes

Stormi reminded every MG and Apprentice to report their hours by October 31, 2025 no later than 11:59 p.m. She will be sending individual updates to every Apprentice and MG regarding their newly completed graduation and recertification VRS requirements. She reiterated that MGs can contact her by Oct. 5 for her help in completing their recertification or graduation hours. After that date, she may not know of any opportunities or have ideas for fulfilling the requirements.

Apprentice presentations in Waldport (2 presentations) and Lincoln City (2 presentations) had a strong showing of support. South Beach's "Evening in the Garden" will be on September 19 from 3:30 to 5:00.

Graduation and Recertification ceremonies and potluck will be held on Wednesday, Nov. 12 from 4:30 to 6:30 p.m. at the OCCC South Beach campus. Stormi has contacted the Hospitality Committee, had no response and would like to hear back from them. She asked MGs for help and ideas with the Apprentice portion of the program, and would like help with the slide show section.

2026 Apprentice Program Training is under development. Sessions are blocked out and plans for program promotion have begun.

As of September 5, community contacts numbered 1,556 according to VRS recording, E&O and outside sources, and does not include ECCO. This number is down approx. 459 from 2024 due to our tabling absence at the Lincoln County Fair. Stormi asks that MGs who made community contacts outside of E & O, such as community presentations, tours or other outreach efforts, to please report those numbers to her as they are not always entered in VRS. She needs the name of the event, date, names of participating MGs, if applicable.

Community contact numbers represent a tangible, quantifiable measure of MG impact in our community. High activity numbers indicate greater community support and reflect the vitality of the program. Stormi recognizes that not all contacts are captured in VRS, etc. She reports our activities to/for Lincoln County Government administration sources. Since a percentage of property taxes support OSU Extension Service, reported contacts of MG programs help the OSU Extension Service provide support to the MG program. The Lincoln County Master Gardener TM Association: Event Contact Tracker form was made available. The form was discussed; MGs were asked to use the form. It will be updated as “2nd shift” is not always relevant.

Questions from Larry King: How are contacts made via the radio program captured? Answer: Stormi did not know. Larry will contact station. Can the number of ‘Unique Visitors’ as reported in the website report be applied to the contact number total? Answer: yes.

OSU group form, “Acknowledgement of Risk and Waiver of Liability” (IRMS 08.01.22), was distributed to the Board and Demo Garden Leaders, and was discussed. Evie Smith asked that all DGLs have community visitors sign this form, especially if any non-LCMGA community members perform volunteer work in the gardens. The requirement applies to any offsite community workshops/presentations with a “hands-on” component, or if they (community volunteers) will be working with gardening tools, and/or lifting/pushing/unloading, etc. The form is to be used for: 1) gardeners/visitors, garden groups and community members visiting the garden. (It is not for OSU Staff or MGs as a previous Waiver of Risk and Liability form had been signed and submitted as part of the program’s required documentation); 2) anyone under the age of 18. The form must be co-signed by a parent or guardian. Signatures are required for all outdoor activities, including portions of indoor classes that have an outdoor garden component. It is not required for indoor classes unless tools are being used. Completed forms can be given to Celia August during normal work hours, or placed in the OSU Extension 24-hour Drop Box after hours, which is located next to the front door.

MGs working with youth: notify Stormi 2 weeks in advance of the date. Stormi will register the event with the Youth Office of Protection. Information needed: type of kid-oriented activity, who are the MGs, when, where.

Listserv problems: matters were discussed with OSU IT department. OSU has implemented a stricter online procedure, and suggests that MGs check their spam, junk, quarantine, safe list folders, etc. Stormi suggests that MGs add the following listserv sender address to their “safe list”:

Publicity: Larry King

Larry proposed to the Board to make the monthly publicity report a part of the website monthly report. Proposal was approved.

Larry reported that social media usage levels have changed. The most popular social media is Facebook followed by Instagram (#1, and 2). The publicity committee is putting together a “how to do” publicity playbook in both electronic and print versions. Their goal for completion is January/February 2026. Trish Riley asked if it was possible to tie-in the playbook with the new policies and procedures manual. Larry thought that it was possible. Gary asked if there was access to DropBox for forms and board info. Larry will pursue the matter. See Website report for developments following 9/8 Board meeting re Dropbox and file storage.

Demo Gardens

Lincoln City Demo Garden:

Kathy Burke wrote: “The last month at the Lincoln City Demo Garden has been a busy one. We continue to provide vegetables for the Lincoln City Food Pantry. This month we have been able to provide nearly 20 lbs. of summer vegetables including green beans, eggplants, summer squash, herbs, tomatoes and more.

Our vegetable beds are transitioning to fall crops like cauliflower, broccoli, garlic, and kohlrabi. We have been trying our hand at propagation for the plant sale with lavender and rosemary transplants, and rock rose, huckleberry and honeysuckle cuttings in the nursery right now.

This month also saw the finishing touches being applied to the Sensory Garden Self-Guided Tour experience. New signage and maps help visitors enjoy the garden using all their senses.

Our apprentices finished their projects and two have presented their findings at the open house that was held last week with nearly 20 in attendance. Sadly, an apprentice had a personal scheduling problem and was unable to attend. She will be providing a summary of her project later.

Our new signage is in place and has been well received. Please check out another article with more information about our new signs.

We continue to have Garden Parties on Wednesday, September 10 and 24 and October 8 and 22 from 4PM to 6PM. Please join us as we transition the garden to Fall mode and make plans for next year.”

OSU Extension Service’s Lincoln City Demo Garden made front page cover news in the [Oregon Coast Today](#), August issue with a feature article of their Sensory Garden entitled appropriately “Heaven Scent”.

Waldport Demo Garden:

Carita Edson wrote: “Our two accomplished apprentices presented their projects to the community and Master Gardeners on Saturday, August 30. They did a fantastic job on methods to control slugs! There was a great crowd of interested gardeners and lots of questions.

We used our very own compost at our last garden day. This compost was started last season in our brand-new compost bins. It looks and smells great!

We’ve been tending our beds and harvesting our vegetables at our garden days. Excess veggies go to the Food Share in Waldport.

Unfortunately, some of our squash and cucumbers have powdery mildew. We have been removing infected leaves and pruning, but the dry conditions and high humidity have not helped. Luckily it is towards the end of the season for these vegetables.

Our next open house will be Saturday, September 27 in the garden from 12-2 pm where garden leaders will give a presentation on cover crops. We’ll plant some in the garden and participants can take home samples of cover crops. This is part of the Education Series through OCCC and counts as continuing education.

The garden is a happy place to be at this time of year seeing the rewards of all our hard work. Remember everyone is invited to visit us on our Wednesday Garden Days 11-1 p

South Beach Demo Garden:

Joan Crall wrote: “Food Share donations have picked up with a weekly donation of bush beans, squash and assorted veggies. The Fall crops of snap peas and bush beans are doing well and should produce into October. A memorial stone was placed for Claudette Schroeder by a group of her friends to remember the “Tomato Queen”. Apprentice Showcase is coming up on September 19th from 3:30 to 5 pm. Steve, myself and Debbie Poland will be hosting a basic apple class and apple tasting on September 26th. Sign up is through OCCC. We still need to get the greenhouse and arbor stained before Winter, which will require a work party in early October.”

Joan asked Stormi to inquire why demo garden activities are not allowed after 5:00 pm, while indoor classroom events are held later than 5:00. Stormi will look into the rationale for this.

6. Updates on priorities

Demo Gardens Steering Committee

Mary Jane Bonelitz reported that the steering committee is looking at infrastructures, funding/grants. Their priorities are 1) irrigation, 2) signage/QR codes, 3) accessibility and to provide spaces in the gardens for everyone. Look for more information to come.

Seed Library

Anne Irving reported the committee is comprised of Amy Shoulders (lead), Julie Erickson and Sharon Busby. Anne will assist in 2026. Amy attempted to meet with the Newport Library Director, but was unable to do so. The committee hopes to meet this fall to develop plans for the process, use of forms and to simplify use and access. Question: will the library accept seeds from home gardens? Answer: There are a number of problems with implementation including handling seeds from other garden sources.



Carole Hardy, Multnomah County



Carole Hardy brings deep knowledge, gentle leadership, and a commitment to community to her work with the Multnomah County Master Gardener Program. A forest ecologist and environmental science educator, Carole has developed inclusive, research-based educational programming that expands the Master Gardener mission in meaningful ways.

Carole partnered with Title I schools like Arleta and Marysville Elementary to create a series of family workshops at the Multnomah County Demonstration Garden. These hands-on sessions, reaching over 250 students and parents annually, connect gardening with ecology, food systems, and environmental stewardship.

She also launched the free “Learn in the Garden” workshop series, opening the Demo Garden to the public on Sundays, offering practical, seasonal classes on pollinators, native plants, climate resilience, food gardening, and more. Carole has grown community partnerships with nonprofits like Feed the Mass, All Saints Episcopal Food Pantry, and Wisdom of the Elders.

To increase belonging among volunteers, Carole extended Demo Garden hours to evenings and weekends, making participation more accessible. She’s cultivated a space where newer and seasoned volunteers collaborate, learn, and lead together.

Carole’s impact continues through her work on the Garden Future initiative and new curriculum for 10-Minute University™, supporting education for all levels of gardeners. Her efforts exemplify what it means to foster a sense of place, purpose, and belonging—planting seeds of knowledge that grow strong community roots.

Kristie Kalb & Stephen Kalb, Marion County



Kristie and Stephen Kalb are champions of inclusive, community-rooted garden education. After completing the Seed to Supper program in 2016, they launched local classes throughout Marion and Polk Counties—sharing food-growing skills with individuals facing food insecurity. In response to growing community needs, they expanded the curriculum into Grow Your Own on a Budget, offering broader access to affordable gardening education.

Their classes are delivered evenings and weekends, directly within neighborhoods—eliminating barriers like transportation and meeting people where they are. From churches to apartment complexes to schools, the Kalbs continually cultivate community partnerships, including with Marion-Polk Food Share.

Both Kristie, a former nurse, and Stephen, a healthcare administrator, bring deep listening, humility, and teaching expertise to every interaction. They foster trust and belonging—especially among underrepresented communities. Their inclusive mindset led them to recruit Tomas, a trilingual community member who now reaches new audiences through Spanish-language outreach and even Reddit.

Kristie and Stephen regularly speak at Master Gardener trainings, recruit new volunteers, and mentor trainees. Their presence is welcoming, their approach adaptive, and their reach ever-expanding.

According to faculty, “Kristie and Stephen are the embodiment of this award. They are passionate about inclusivity and work hard to include everyone in their teaching. They have taught dozens of residents how to grow vegetables—and they generously mentor the next generation of gardeners.”

With compassion and commitment, the Kalbs are growing not just gardens—but community.

STATEWIDE BEHIND THE SCENES AWARDS

Colleta (Colet) Allen, Jackson County



Since becoming a Master Gardener in 2012, Colet Allen has been a quiet powerhouse behind nearly every major effort of the Jackson County Master Gardener Association (JCMGA). A long-time board member and dedicated volunteer, Colet's contributions often happen behind the scenes—but their impact is felt across the region.

She is deeply involved in key working groups including Spring Garden Fair, Winter Dreams Summer Gardens, Membership, Community Outreach, and Events. She coordinates speakers for the Master Gardener Speakers Bureau, organizing presentations for clubs, nonprofits, and libraries throughout the valley. Her leadership has brought Master Gardener education to wider audiences through OLLI (Osher Lifelong Learning Institute) and local library systems.

Stephanie Hazen, Marion County



Since becoming a Master Gardener in 2018, Stephanie Hazen has poured her time, talent, and passion into public education and outreach—especially around pollinators, native plants, and wildlife. A retired veterinarian and Master Mellitologist, Stephanie is a tireless behind-the-scenes force in Marion County and across the state.

Stephanie creates and maintains displays used by other Master Gardeners, trains volunteers in public speaking, and coordinates materials for plant clinics and tabling events. Her hands-on “Bee vs. Fly vs. Wasp” display is a hit at the Oregon State Fair, Ag Fest, and the Englewood Forest Festival, captivating children and families alike. In 2023, she led the county's first Pollinator Symposium in partnership with Marion Soil & Water Conservation District—an event that drew hundreds—and is already planning future events.

She photographs, writes, and curates educational slide shows used statewide and shares seed packets, made and assembled by hand, complete with custom plant photos and growing instructions. She and her husband, Ray Temple, raise Monarchs, grow milkweed, and design pollinator gardens.

In 2024 alone, Stephanie logged over 370 volunteer hours, reached 1,900 contacts, and traveled more than 1,600 miles in service to the Master Gardener Program. She also helps coordinate educational programs with Salem Audubon, Ankeny Wildlife Refuge, and Heritage Seedlings—netting donations of native seeds and seedlings to support outreach and plant sales.

Stephanie's dedication, generosity, and relentless commitment to science-based outreach make her a model behind-the-scenes contributor and a true ambassador for the Master Gardener mission.

STATEWIDE BEHIND THE SCENES AWARDS

Dan McDonald, Washington County



Dan McDonald is the driving force behind the Washington County Master Gardener Association's Grow 1 Give 1 (G1G1) project—an outreach initiative that connects food pantry clients with resources to grow their own food. Under Dan's leadership, the program has flourished: in 2024, Master Gardeners grew and distributed 753 plants, 407 grow bags with soil, and 1,700 seed packets. Volunteers connected with 200 community members and provided garden education to 915 participants across seven food pantries. For 2025, the program is expanding to serve nine sites and will give away more than 1,100 plants.

Dan coordinates more than two dozen volunteer growers, developed a class to train them in vegetable propagation, and leads the WCMGA Learning Garden's vegetable team. His behind-the-scenes efforts build confidence in volunteers and expand access to fresh food and garden knowledge throughout the community.

In addition to G1G1, Dan has served two years on the WCMGA board as Business Manager, teaches classes for the public and fellow Master Gardeners, and is a core leader of Gardenfest, the chapter's annual fundraising event. Since becoming a Master Gardener in 2020, he has contributed over 1,100 volunteer hours—nearly 500 of them in 2024 alone.

Dan exemplifies the mission of the Master Gardener Program through his dedication, leadership, and commitment to community food access. His steady behind-the-scenes work has created meaningful change for both volunteers and the communities they serve. Congratulations, Dan!

Emerald Lewis: Malheur County Behind the Scenes Award




Emerald Lewis has quietly become a pillar of support in Malheur County’s Master Gardener Program through her steadfast dedication and behind-the-scenes contributions.

- Setting up free Google Workspace for non-profits so we can discontinue DropBox (and stop paying our annual contract).


